Introduction

There have been major theoretical developments in the social sciences since the early 2000s (e.g., the emergence of strength-based theories in forensic contexts), which arguably can and should inform policy and practice. Despite this, there has been a disconnect between strength-based theory, policy and practice, notable through aspects of the oftentimes punitive community/public protection model, as one example. As such, we, as editors, are interested in nuances surrounding continuity and change in relation to policy and practice responses to preventing and/or responding to sexual crime. As such, we are seeking contributions in relation to how influential theoretical ideas relating to rehabilitation and reintegration have continued to inform, frame and challenge contemporary policy and practice. Therefore, this special issue seeks to capture applied research that utilises an established strength-oriented theoretical perspective(s), such as the Good Lives Model (Ward & Mann, 2004) and the integrative theory of desistance from sexual offending (Göbbels et al., 2012). Overall, we are keen to review contributions that can offer a meaningful and novel synthesis between theory, research, policy, and practice. The special issue also places a firm emphasis on the requirement for contributions to involve and champion individuals in the early stages of their research career. This extends to practitioners from forensic contexts, who similarly may be new to research and academia. In practice, contributions should include one or more individuals who self-define as being early career.

- The overarching aims of the special issue are as follows:
- To identify novel applied research exploring issues relating to sexual crime, prevention, reintegration, and desistance.
- To provide a dissemination platform for early career researchers engaging in applied criminological research to inform policy and practice.
- To promote evidence-based recommendations for policy and practice in relation to sexual crime, prevention, reintegration, and desistance.

Following the recent release and pardon of Kathleen Folbigg, the **UNSW Faculty of Law and Justice and the University of Sydney Law School** are jointly hosting a day-long symposium focused on Ms Folbigg's wrongful conviction and its socio-legal implications.

The aim is to host a series of critical presentations spanning a variety of subjects, ranging from law and gender, the use of probabilistic (i.e. tendency and coincidence) reasoning, reliance on diaries as admissions, our system of criminal appeals, the politicised process of additional appeals and public inquiries, media representations, relations between law, science and medicine, and the prospect of a criminal cases commission.
